

The scheme will bring Hammersmith:

- A new four screen cinema, with shops, restaurants and cafes
- 204 new homes of which 52 per cent will be classified as genuinely-affordable for local residents
- A new public rooftop bar and restaurant
- New community art and event spaces
- New affordable, flexible office spaces for start-up businesses
- New corporate offices for established private businesses bringing hundreds of new employees who'll be customers for our local shops, and eating and drinking establishments
- The removal of the ugly Town Hall extension
- New public space in front of the restored Town Hall for performances and events
- New homework space for children and students
- A new civic campus which is inclusively designed to ensure for full access for Disabled people
- Eco-friendly buildings to minimise carbon footprint and cut fuel bills.
